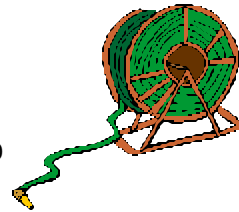
Calling All Neighbors...

News from the Yard Doctor

Watering in the heat of summer

When the heat is on, watering schedules must be altered to avoid dry, brown grass. If weather becomes windy, hot and dry for a lengthened period of time, add a few more watering sessions per week to your normal schedule. By spreading out 30-minute watering sessions throughout the week, lawns should survive the hot summer heat. It is also acceptable to not water during hot, dry weather. However, after deciding to let the grass go dormant, stick with the decision. Following an irregular watering schedule will stress the plant and make it more susceptible to damage.



Quench your lawn's thirst



Simple steps can be taken to properly water a thirsty lawn. Water early in the day when the wind is calm and the sun has not yet risen. Doing so prevents the leaf's surface from drying out and reduces the potential for disease, which can result from watering at night. Most lawns need about one inch of water per week during the spring and summer to flourish, however, you may need to adjust this rule slightly to fit your lawn's specific needs.

Mow your way to a healthy lawn

Proper mowing techniques are key to maintaining a healthy, weed-free yard and reducing pesticide dependency. Follow the one-third rule: Never remove more than one-third of the leaf blade during any single mowing. This will require mowing more frequently in the spring and summer, but will result in thicker grass and fewer weeds.
